



PSLE Scoring System





Adjustment to the Education System



- PSLE and Secondary 1 posting, move away from Tscore, to scoring students in broader bands.
- Secondary school Subject-based Banding. Under Full SBB, there will no longer be separate Express, N(A), and N(T) courses, and students will be in mixed form classes where they can interact with peers of different strengths and interests.
- Broadening DSA and ensuring a more variegated school landscape, including distinctive areas (niches).



PSLE Scoring System



- The PSLE T-Score will be replaced with wider scoring bands, known as Achievement Levels (ALs).
- Each PSLE subject will be scored using 8 ALs.
 Students who perform similarly will be placed in the same AL for each subject.

PSLE Scoring System – Standard Subjects



Your child's PSLE score
will be the sum of the

PSLE Scoring System – Foundation Subjects



- Under the new AL system, if your child is taking foundation subjects, your child will be graded AL A to AL C
- Like standard subject ALs, the foundation subject ALs will reflect a student's level of achievement, rather than how they have performed relative to their peers.



PSLE Scoring System – Foundation Subjects



 For the purpose of S1 posting, Foundation Level AL A to AL C will be mapped to a Standard Level subject equivalent of AL 6 to AL 8 respectively, to derive a student's overall PSLE score.

Grades for Foundation	Foundation Raw Mark Range	Equivalent Standard Level AL

PSLE Scoring System – Mother Tongue Language Exemption



Students exempted from MTL will be assigned an MTL score so they have a PSLE score comprising four subjects, for the purposes of S1 Posting.

Their assigned MTL score will:

Take reference from peers with similar scores for English, Mathematics, and Science.

Maintain parity of treatment with students who take Foundation MTL (who will score between AL 6 to 8)

Hence, students will receive an assigned MTL score between AL 6 to 8 in PSLE.



PSLE Scoring System – Use of Higher Chinese Language for admission to SAP schools



- If your child takes HCL in primary school, your child will receive an advantage when applying to SAP schools. The same approach is taken in today's T-Score system.
- If multiple students with the same PSLE Score apply for places in the same SAP school, those with better HCL grades will be allocated a place ahead of other students. This applies before the tie-breakers for S1 posting.




PSLE Scoring System – Use of HCL for admission to SAP schools

Secondary School SchoolFinder Portal



- MOE has released the indicative AL COP for each secondary school.
- The indicative AL COPs is based on simulations using students' PSLE results and school choice patterns from the previous year's PSLE cohort.







Secondary School Subject-Based Banding (SBB)







- Students will have the flexibility to take different subjects at G1, G2 and G3 based on their strengths, interests and learning needs.
- Students will subsequently access programmes and post-secondary pathways based on their various subjects and subject level combinations.
- Mixed form classes at lower secondary





Subjects at a more demanding level

 All secondary school students can offer English Language, Mother Tongue Languages, Mathematics and Science at a more demanding level from the start of Secondary One based on students' PSLE Achievement Level (AL) for each subject.

Subjects at a more demanding level

Students will also be able to offer Humanities subjects (Geography, History, and Literature in English) at a more demanding level from Secondary Two. The criteria for taking Humanities at a more demanding level will be based on students' aptitude for and interest in these subjects at Secondary One.

Subjects at a less demanding level

- In some instances, students may have flexibility to offer <u>some</u> <u>subjects at a less demanding level</u> from Secondary One.
- Students who face exceptional difficulties coping with MTL learning will have the option to offer G1 or G2 MTL. This is in line with the intent of Full SBB, which encourages students to better <u>customise their learning according to their strengths</u>. With the greater flexibility afforded by the MTL offerings at G1, G2, and G3, MTL 'B' will be discontinued in secondary schools.
- Further details on the guidelines for students to take subjects at a less demanding level will be made available in due course.





Subjects Taken at Lower Secondary Level		
Common Curriculum subjects	Subjects Offered at G1, G2 and G3

In their mixed form classes, students will take a set of subjects at a common level, amounting to about one-third of curriculum time.	Students may take these subjects at a more or less demanding level, subject to eligibility criteria and guidelines.	
This would allow students in mixed form classes to spend curriculum time together in these subjects.	Students will be grouped in different classes based on their subject level for each subject.	



Secondary School Eligibility for HMTL



For your child to take Higher Mother Tongue Language, your child should meet the following criteria:

Eligibility Criteria for Secondary School HMTL

(i) An overall PSLE score of 8 or better

<u>OR</u>

(ii) An overall PSLE Score of 9 to 14 (inclusive); and attain AL 1 / AL 2 in MTL or Distinction / Merit in HMTL



Secondary School Eligibility for HMTL



- Eligibility criteria is intended to ensure that your child will be able to cope with the higher academic load.
- Even if your child does not meet the above criteria, secondary schools will continue to have the flexibility to offer HMTL to your child.
- They will assess if your child has a high ability and interest in MTL, and is able to take HMTL without affecting performance in other subjects.



Secondary One (\$1) Posting







\$1 Posting

- Posting to secondary school will still be based on your child's PSLE score. Your child can submit up to 6 different school choices, in order of preference.
- However, with the new PSLE scoring system, more students will have the same PSLE score, and schools will be less differentiated based on cut-off points.
- Tie-breakers are used only if there is more than one student with the same PSLE score vying for the last available place in a school.





\$1 Posting

S1 Posting Tie-Breakers (in order of priority)

- 1. Citizenship (priority given to Singapore Citizens, followed by Permanent Residents and International Students)
- 2. Choice order of schools
- 3. Computerised balloting





Direct School Adm<u>ission</u> (DSA)

Allows for a more diverse range of student achievements and talents to be recognized.

Admission based on:

- qualities such as talent in music, sports, CCAs and leadership
- school-based criteria other than PSLE results
- merit-based academic and non-academic criteria





Direct School Admission (DSA)

- Direct admission into Participating Secondary Schools
- Applicants only need to fill in one online form through a centralized online DSA application portal to apply to multiple schools, and their details will be provided electronically to the schools.
- Check the MOE DSA-Sec webpage for information on important dates, the DSA-Sec process, participating schools and their talent areas, around April 2023.

Direct School Admission (DSA)

 If your child is admitted to a secondary school through DSA-Sec, they are <u>not</u> <u>allowed</u> to submit school choices during the Secondary 1 (S1) posting process.





How do I keep my child safe online? . 04

Strong Passwords

Show your child what a strong password is by using examples, such as one with combinations of upper and lowercase letters and numerals. Remind your child to change passwords regularly and to use different passwords for different accounts.





Illustrate with an example of what could happen if his or her passwords are known to others. Reach an agreement to be kept informed of your child's passwords until he or she reaches a certain age or are able to show good online behaviours.

Parental Controls

If you intend to install parental controls and privacy filters in the digital devices, explain to your child why it is necessary. Have an open discussion with your child on harmful internet content such as pornography, violence and religious radicalisation.

Remind your child not to chat with strangers online. He or she should inform you if there are online messages / posts / photos that make him or her feel uncomfortable.
